DISCOVER LOS VAQUEROS



Spring is the perfect time to discover the Los Vaqueros Reservoir and Watershed. The 160,000-acre-foot reservoir is where your drinking water is stored before it is treated, and you'll find a variety of recreational opportunities in the watershed.



Fishing: A well-equipped marina with helpful attendants, rental boats and fishing piers is available on the south side of the reservoir. A fishing platform is located on the north side. For current conditions, call the marina at **925-371-2628**.

Hiking: More than 55 miles of hiking trails are available, with 12 miles designated as multi-purpose.

Picnicking: Several landscaped picnic areas are offered, including group areas for corporate and family events.

Interpretive Center: On the north side of the reservoir, the John Muir Interpretive Center is open weekends with displays and educational programs.
